

ANNUAL REPORT 2016



CELEBRATING COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

2016 was a memorable year. The new year began with the completion of the long awaited Phyllis Bornt Branch Library & Literacy Center at 948 State St. The construction of the new library was made possible by a bequest to our Board of Trustees from retired librarian, Phyllis Bornt, which laid the foundation for the Schenectady County Legislature to match the funds. We also had assistance from the Metroplex Development Authority, the City of Schenectady IDA, three New York State Construction grants awarded by the Mohawk Valley Library System, a \$150,000 donation from our Friends of the Library, a grant from the Wright Family Foundation for technology, and a grant from the Schenectady Foundation to enable us to become a Family Place Library.





On February 27, 2016 a ribbon cutting and community Open House was held with over 1,000 people in attendance! The first year of operation far exceeded our expectations with 82,150 residents coming through our doors, many in disbelief that such a modern, bright and beautiful 21st century library was built in the neighborhood. 1,047 residents received a library card for the first time. With an enhanced focus on literacy in all its forms - from early literacy, to digital literacy, financial literacy, health literacy, English as a Second Language classes, and writing programs - a total of 469 programs were offered, with 4,906 in attendance. With the great digital divide that

exists in the neighborhood, the Bornt branch had 20,163 computer users and 13,737 free wireless users. With an enhanced collection of library materials in all formats, 61,169 items were circulated. With 51 hours of operation we have been able to better meet the needs of the community.

Library improvements did not stop here! Construction projects were successfully completed at several branches, including the repair of Niskayuna's roof and exterior back entrance; and the glass enclosure of Glenville's program room.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS





Early literacy classes for pre-school children and families remain a priority of library programming, with nearly 600 classes given throughout the year.

Through our partnership with miSci, every branch received three STEM programs for school aged children. In addition, the museum received a grant from Glasko-Smith Kline (GSK) to provide summer classes at Central and branches on electricity, magnetism and sound for 1st-5th graders. Friends of SCPL funded a huge variety of professional quality programs, from High Peaks Juggling, Birds of Prey and other animal and nature adventures, to live

theater and puppet shows. We also offered Lego club, cooking club, yoga story times and many other unique opportunities to create art, crafts and music at the library.

SCPL held a Bookface photo contest and social media campaign, involving book covers– for Library Lover's Month in February.

Local, award winning author Anne Blankman returned to SCPL to introduce her newest historical fiction book called **Traitor Angels**.

We started the summer season off with a special event at the Bornt Branch library. The New York State Summer Reading kick-off brought local dignitaries, as well as the Commissioner of Education Mary Ellen Elia, to the library to encourage summer reading and participation in the state wide effort to reduce summer slide. Over 1,300 children and teens

were summer readers at our libraries, and over 7,000 attended summer programs.

We jumped on the popular Pokémon GO bandwagon during the summer by having libraries be Poké Stops and Poké Gyms.

Comic Con attracted a large crowd of children, teens and families who enjoyed presentations by graphic novelists and artists, including Dave Roman and Greg Capullo.

We once again had a great group of teen writers for a week of summer writing camp with instructors Marni

Gillard and Jack Rightmyer.

The Bornt Branch introduced programming specific to Family Place Libraries, including Stay & Play, which emphasizes early literacy support through play. They also provided a series of workshops to provide support to Family, Friend and Neighbor caregivers, so they could learn how to incorporate early literacy skills to the children in their care.

SICM provided free lunches all summer to youth at Central and Mont Pleasant.

We were honored to have NYS Comptroller, Thomas DiNapoli, visit the Bornt Branch during the school spring break week, as part of a citywide visit. He was able to spend some time with the children who were receiving free lunches during the week, thanks to Schenectady Rotary volunteers.

In December, Reference staff held a promotion of Mango, our language learning service, and distributed more than 150 Mango smoothies at Central and the Bornt Branch. Usage of Mango nearly quadrupled over the year before to 475 sessions for the month.







The Central Library hosted the Housing is a Human Right: 28th art exhibit by Rachel Falcone and Michael Premo, as part of Schenectady's participation in the Breathing Lights project for the month of November.

Thanks to the County's support of our Long Range Technology Plan, many libraries received updated computers and we were able to replace our aging microfilm readers with new computerized units which greatly enhanced the services we are able to provide to researchers.

In collaboration with the Schenectady County Historical Society, we received a grant to jointly send two dozen reels of microfilm of the Schenectady Reflector (one of our major nineteenth-century papers) to be scanned and made searchable by the New York State Historic Newspapers Project.

No matter what else is happening in the world beyond our doors, all of us value our libraries for different reasons. For me, the library has always been a refuge, a place to leave my worries behind for a bit while I escape into the stacks. For many of its patrons, however, the Schenectady County Public Library (SCPL) provides the chance to use a computer for a job search, be tutored in English, learn to manage their finances, or spend quality time as a family in a safe, warm space. In 2016, the SCPL provided all of that to its patrons and more, and I am proud to highlight a few of those achievements.

In February, we celebrated the opening of the SCPL's newest branch, the Phyllis Bornt Library Branch and Literacy Center. Throughout its first year, the Bornt exceeded all expectations. Its success may be measured not only by tremendous circulation statistics and program attendance, including over a thousand new patrons who got their very first library cards, but also through the enthusiastic responses from the community it serves. The project received tremendous support from Schenectady County legislators, the County Manager and other community partners, and we are thankful not only for their funding support, but for the time, counsel and caring that all brought to its completion. We are also grateful to the many other funders who made this beautiful new space possible, including the incredibly generous support of The Friends of the Schenectady County Public Library, The Mohawk Valley Library System, The State of New York Public Library Construction Grants, The Wright Family Foundation, The Schenectady Foundation, and, of course, former Schenectady County librarian, Miss Phyllis Bornt, and The Bornt Bequest through the SCPL Board of Trustees. Miss Bornt's love of reading – and her desire to inspire others to share her passion – truly made the vision for this branch a reality.

The Friends of the SCPL celebrated its 50th Anniversary with a series of successful events throughout 2016. We salute the Friends for all their support and look forward to the next 50 years of working together to strengthen the Library and grow its services in our community.

Brown Girl Dreaming, by Jacqueline Woodson, winner of the 2014 National Book Award for Young People's Literature, was chosen for the SCPL's "One County, One Book" community read. Events included a discussion of the book, a film series, memoir writing workshop, guest readers in the schools, a poetry writing contest, the "Grow A Reader" book drive, a visit with award-winning children's illustrator Bryan Collier, and an author visit with Ms. Woodson.

The Trustee's Planning Committee worked diligently to finalize and receive approval of the SCPL's Long Range Plan of Service for 2017-2019. Input from a community forum hosted in June helped to inform the committee in preparing the plan. You can review this plan on the library website at www.scpl.org.

Thanks to the advocacy efforts of the trustees, SCPL's 2017 budget included restoring a Librarian IV position to head Youth Services, an increase in security hours, and several capital projects. Thank you to the Schenectady County Legislature, as well as our County Manager and Budget Director, for supporting these budgetary initiatives.

2016 marked my first year as president of the Schenectady County Public Library's Board of Trustees. My learning curve was steep, so it was lucky for me that my fellow trustees shared their experience and knowledge with me throughout the year. Our community benefits greatly from their dedicated service.



And, finally, we are so fortunate to have the talented staff members of the Schenectady County Public Library, led by our Director, Karen Bradley, who make all this excitement happen throughout all of our branches. I thank them all for their creative and energetic work.


